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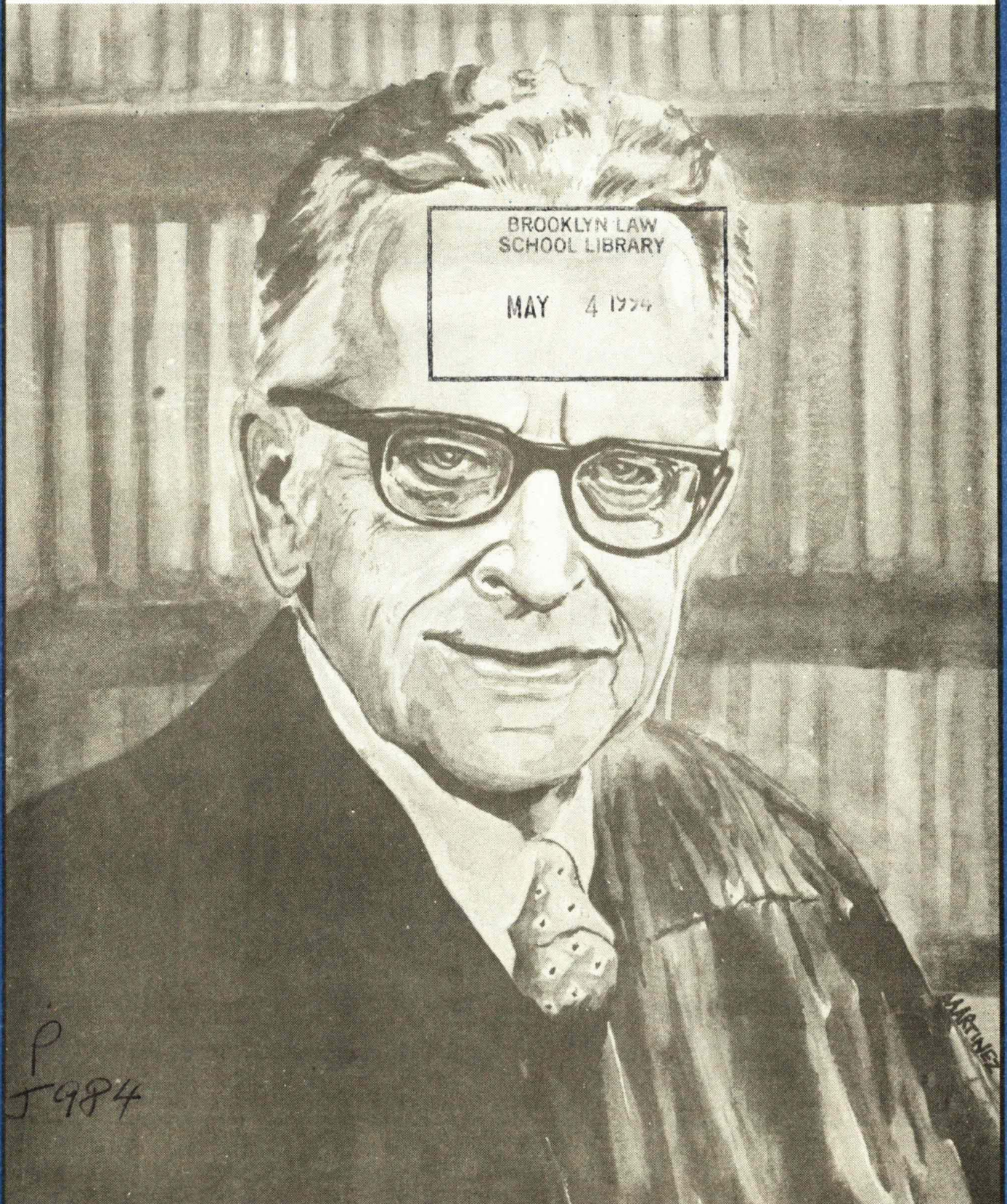

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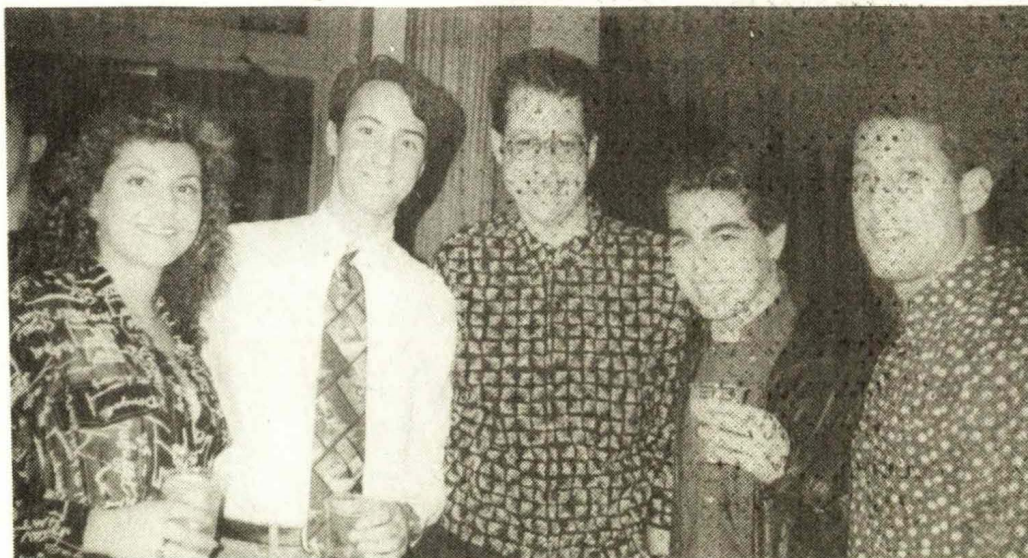
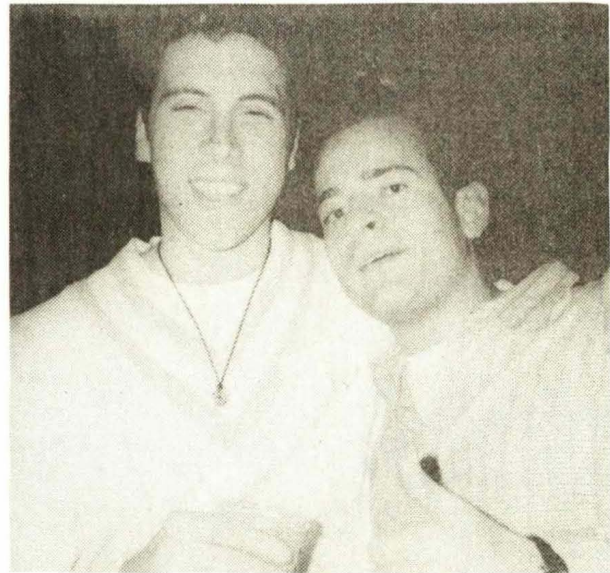

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# The Legacy of Harry Blackmun

In the name of liberty, the people can no longer choose which side to take in the most heated moral debate of our time. *Roe v. Wade*, 1973.

In the name of liberty, there is no crime so horrific and despicable that one who commits it can be deemed by the people as unworthy of human existence. Dissent to the denial of *certiorari*, *Callins v. Collins*, 1994.

In the name of fairness, states should not be able to ensure the maintenance of a competent state judicial system by enacting a retirement age. Dissent in *Gregory v. Ashcroft*, 1991.

In the name of viewpoint diversity, the Federal Communications Commission can favor minority applicants over non-minority applicants for radio station licenses. Can such a policy avoid perpetuating the grossly false stereotype that one's views can be revealed by the color of his skin? Joining Brennan's opinion in *Metro Broadcasting, Inc. v. FCC*, 1990.

In the name of racial equality, Justice Blackmun would allow a state to create a Congressional district designed to ensure the election of a black politician, further lending credence to the absolutely false idea that blacks can only be represented by other blacks, and thus reinforcing the degrading stereotype that members of racial groups are incapable of thinking as individuals and reaching their own conclusions. Dissent in *Shaw v. Reno*, 1993.

In the name of free speech, a community cannot, through a legitimate democratic process, decide that in their town, their sense of decency and

respect for women will not be undermined by nude dancers parading around local taverns. Dissent in *Barnes v. Glenn Theatre, Inc.*, 1991.

In the name of freedom of religion, a state should exempt a religious group from any law that happens to adversely affect that group, absent a compelling interest. Yet, it seems that excusing a religious group from obeying laws that the rest of us must abide by amounts to government favoritism of specific religions, exactly what the first amendment has been held time and again to prohibit. Concurring opinion in *Church of the Lukumi Babalu Aye, Inc. v. City of Hialeah*, 1993.

Somehow the right of a property owner to receive compensation when the state made his land worthless escaped Blackmun's usual compassion for individual rights. Dissent in *Lucas v. South Carolina Coastal Council*, 1992.

I have chosen to critique the results Blackmun has achieved, rather than consider whether those results have been achieved with a legitimate force of legal reasoning, because it is for the former reason that Blackmun is so often praised. While Harry Blackmun was a fine advocate on the Court, therein lies the problem: he was an *advocate*. Harry Blackmun long ago forgot that it is not who wins or loses the game, but how it is played. The most important role of the Court is to preserve our democracy by resisting the ever-present temptation to legislate on the bench, and to thwart democracy only when commanded to do so by the Constitution of the United States. It is here that Harry Blackmun failed.

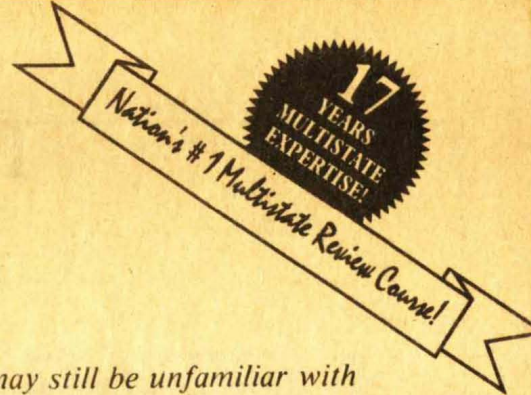
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## TO: PROSPECTIVE BAR EXAMINEES

As you begin preparing for your upcoming bar examination, you may still be unfamiliar with our PMBR Multistate review course. PMBR is a **supplemental** Multistate course that specializes in preparing students for the Multistate Bar Examination (commonly referred to as the "MBE"). As such, PMBR is **NOT** in competition with the general bar review courses (such as BAR/BRI, SMH, Pieper, Rossen, Barpassers) which are primarily designed to prepare students for the essay section, rather than the MBE.

## HAS THE MBE CHANGED WITHIN THE LAST YEAR?

You may have heard rumors that the MBE has changed its format within the last year. Although the MBE is still an objective 200-question multiple-choice exam testing the subject areas of **TORTS, CONTRACTS, CRIMINAL LAW, EVIDENCE, CONSTITUTIONAL LAW, & PROPERTY**, subtle new changes have occurred. The three main changes involve (1) the length of the questions, (2) new topic areas and (3) "crossover testing" patterns. First, the length of the questions are becoming longer. On the July, 1993 MBE each section of the exam was 50 pages in length. Many students (who were unfamiliar with the new longer question format) had difficulty finishing the exam on time! Second, within the last year many new topic areas are being tested on the MBE, such as Riparian Water Rights, Assignability of Mortgages, Partition Proceedings, Federal Statutory Crimes, Concomitant Wills, and Rights of First Refusal as covered under the Rule Against Perpetuities. Thirdly, another subtle change involves the implementation of new "crossover" testing patterns involving, for example, an interrelationship of Civil Procedure and Torts relating to Directed Verdicts and Summary Judgments.

# Drive-By-Bravado

The sky was overcast and gray, and a light mist pierced the sharp gusts of wind that occasionally ripped into our young faces. We were less than ten strong, with the oldest among us not more than thirteen years old. I had no idea at the time, in fact none of us did, that this day would change each and every one of us forever.

The first time I really began to understand what this whole thing was about, other than what I had been taught in school or at home, was by way of a beat up, old, gold colored, Chevrolet Monte Carlo. The driver, obviously not brave enough to do his dirty work up close and in person, did it as his car sped by a bunch of ten year old kids. The following morning, some of my friends and I got our first fifteen minutes of fame as we were turned into mini-celebrities, and given the opportunity to get questioned by a real, live police detective. It seems that during the evening, the drive-by-man, or perhaps someone else did his best rendition of an infamous hate symbol at our expense. Cultural expression notwithstanding, where he chose to do his spray painting was not appreciated. In fact, the sight alone forced some people to relive extremely painful memories. For the rest of us who were too young, or fortunate enough not to have such memories to repress, it was another painful reminder of our past and our present. Though it would not be the last of its kind, as frightening as the whole episode was to me at the time, it was still somewhat diluted. The rainy day I was to experience a few years later solved that problem.

One weekend, some classmates and I were staying at a hotel. A stop off at a local supermarket was decided upon, so one of my classmates who lived in the neighborhood pointed us in the proper direction, and then disappeared to take care of some errands.

As we were wearing our yarmulkes at the time, we were quickly noticed by the locals. A mob

soon began to follow us, and one person had enough guts to throw something, hitting one of my friends in the head. Fortunately, the only thing hurt was his pride. We quickly reached our planned destination, and with the mob still in pursuit, piled into the small local supermarket en masse. The owner, apparently fearful for his own sake, threw us out because too many of us had come into the place at once. None of us wanted to go back out *there*, but we did not have much of a choice, so out we went. We made a fast left turn to head back to the safety of our hotel, noticed that the number of people following us seemed to grow exponentially. Although we had all heard the words before, this time it was different. This was no longer something we learned about in school, or heard from the stories of our grandparents. This was not something that had happened to someone else. This was real. *This was happening to us.*

No one wanted to be last in our little clique for the very rational reason that should they fall behind they would be the easiest to grab. So we sped up our pace, constantly changing positions from front of the line to the back. We did not run, and perhaps we should have, since there were still close fifty of them and less than ten of us.

The cat and mouse game finally ended when one of the larger members of the pack behind us came barreling through our little group without warning. We were caught off guard and off balance. The ice had finally been broken, and within seconds of that crash, the mob behind us had worked up enough courage to no longer be content with simply lagging behind. With wild cries and flailing arms the chase was on. At that point our bodies and minds told us that it was time to get away from here *Right Now*. Run we did, and as fast as our little legs could move us.

A friend of mine was not fast enough. I realized that after I came running into the hotel at

breakneck speed and discovered he was not inside. I ran upstairs to my classmates who had already made it back to the hotel, and told them that "Michael" did not make it. No one followed me back outside and I never noticed that little detail until much later.

From my vantage point as I ran up the block, it was clear that Michael had been pretty well worked over. He was bleeding from his mouth, his clothes were a mess, there was dirt in his hair, and there was a crowd of very large kids standing around him taking turns and using him as punching bag. As I got closer he was kicked into a thorn bush.

What happened next is one of those memories that is forever imprinted on my mind in slow motion. One of the pack had seen me approaching and moved toward me, either to cut me off from Michael, or perhaps to use me for some punching practice of his own. I remember him well. He was much taller and much bigger than I was, with short black hair, blue jeans, and a brown plaid shirt. In as serious a voice as I could possibly muster at that moment, with all my adrenalin flowing, I told him to "move your ass and get out of my way." He obliged, probably thinking I was crazier than he and his cohorts, and he would have been right. I was half his size, clearly outnumbered, and Michael was certainly in no position at that point to render any assistance. I remember turning around to look at him as I made my way toward the rest of the small mob that remained, thinking that at any moment, he or someone else would lunge at me, but he just stood there without any trace of expression left on his face.

Michael was still entangled in the bushes, and they had not yet let up. He was crying by now from his wounds, and that seemed to encourage them further. I walked up to them and "let him go" was the scariest thing I could croak out of my mouth.

He ignored me at first, and then I let out a much louder and stronger "let him go you stupid bastard," and that got his attention. He had stringy, dirty blond hair and gold rimmed glasses, and as he released his grip on my fallen comrade, he stood up, looked at me, and asked me what I would do if

he did not let go of the crybaby Jew boy. I stared back for a moment, realized quicker than he did that I no longer had to come up with an appropriate response, grabbed Michael by the arm, and off we went.

Why I was lucky enough to go through that experience with nary a scratch I will never know. I have asked myself that question more times than I care to remember, and I cannot come up with a logical answer. Under the circumstances, beating me up would have probably been like a stroll in the park. Perhaps I was lucky, and perhaps it was more than just luck.

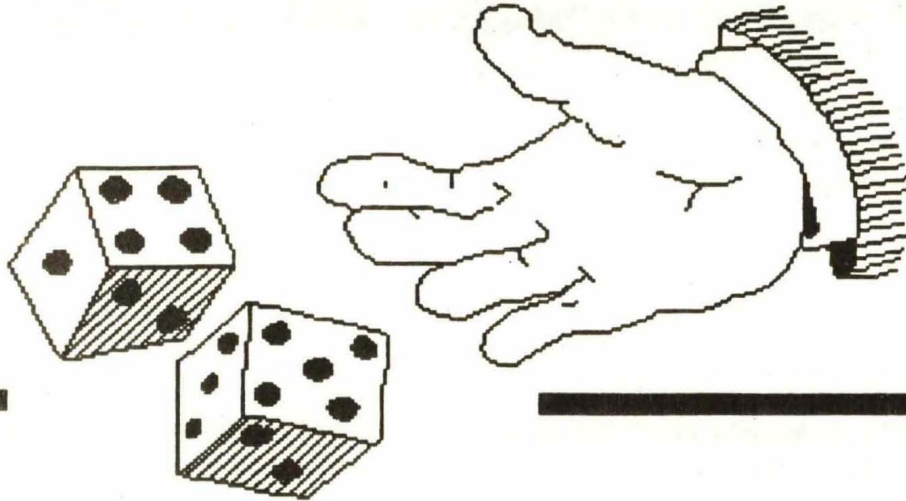
The hotel proprietor told us that the entire episode was our fault. We should have known better than to walk through the streets wearing yarmulkes on our heads. But we weren't taught that way. We were taught differently. We were brought up to be proud of who we were. But on that day we were ashamed of our own behavior and ashamed of the proprietor, himself a Jew, who told us not to behave *too Jewish*. We were ashamed that we ran, and we were ashamed that we did not have the guts to look hatred and ignorance in the face and stand up to it. We were ashamed that we failed to stand strong and united in a moment of crisis.

The experience taught me that as a Jew it is not necessary to worry about finding Anti-Semitism, because Anti-Semitism knows exactly how to find you. Most Jews in this country have never experienced similar acts of hatred, because, for better or for worse, they are quite adept at disappearing into the landscape. The previous generation, (and many unfortunately in this one), believed if we did not open up our mouths too much, people would leave us alone. If we simply blended into the society around us and ignored our Judaism we would stay safe and unassaulted. I make no apologies for the wake up call, but the vast majority of Jews in Europe thought they would be safe *because* they were so cultured and assimilated. Except for the one little detail that they failed to overlook. Hitler and Nazi Germany knew better. They did not care whether the Jews of Europe were old, young, religious, assimilated, modern, backward, rich or poor. You were either a Jew or you were not a Jew. Period. That same line of demarcation reared its



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ugly head once again only a few short weeks ago as vandals fearlessly went through a Jewish cemetery in Queens, and reduced it to a scene that was described as a horror movie. The spineless degenerates who defamed the dead were not very particular about the sort of Jews they were attacking either, and I doubt they would have been any less picky if their intended victims had been alive.

There are people who say that the Holocaust never happened, that we do not have a monopoly on suffering, and that the Jews are the cause of their problems. Every single time we hear those things we are outraged, and rightly so. Saying the Holocaust never happened is as absurd as saying there was never any slavery in this country and that the Africans brought here on slave ships never suffered the indignities of an openly racist society. And while it is true that other groups of people have suffered horribly over time and the Holocaust is certainly not our monopoly, the Holocaust is primarily our tragedy because no other group of people faced the systematic death and destruction of six million men, women, and children. We are outraged when people start to spew forth words of hatred and ignorance, but we are not in favor of changing the Constitution of this country to eliminate free speech. On the contrary, hardly any sane person would disagree with the notion that free speech is a positive thing, but as Jews, we know that words are more than just sounds that emanate from the mouths of human beings. Words can be dangerous and words can be deadly. More than any other group in history we know what *simple* words of hatred can lead to.

I bring up these subjects, and one of my own experiences, for a very simple reason. Their existence, and my own ordeal, can perhaps shed some light on the importance of three relatively recent events on the Jewish calendar. We observed Yom Hashoa, the commemoration of the deaths of the six million Jews who died al kiddush hashem - for the sake of G-d, in the Holocaust, Yom Hazikaron, the commemoration of the deaths of all those who gave up their lives fighting for the State of Israel and the Jewish People, and Yom Ha'atzmaut, the celebration of the formation of the State of Israel. All three passed by with hardly a

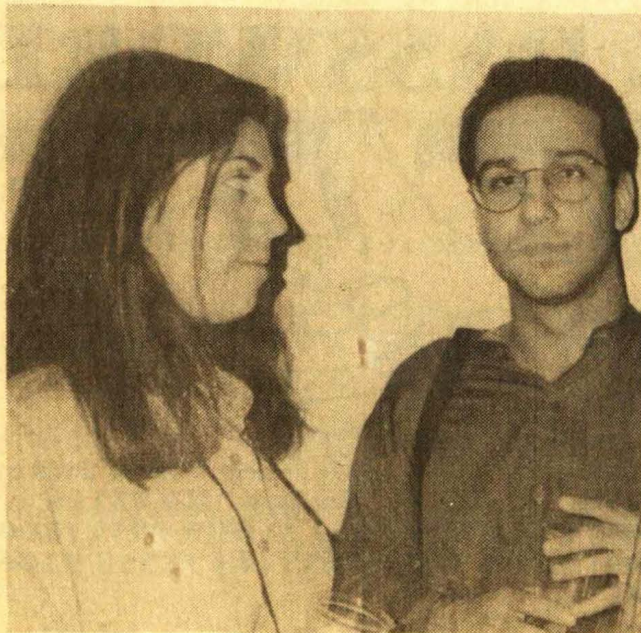
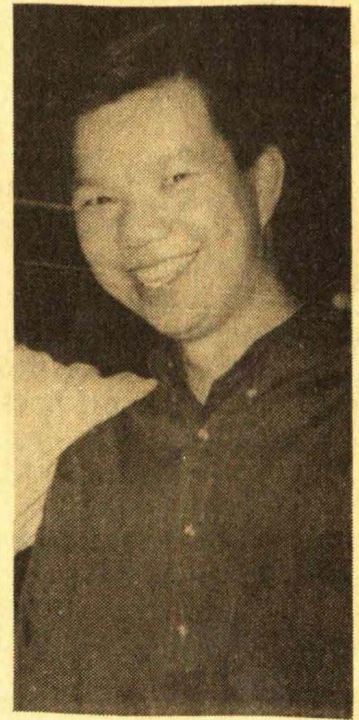
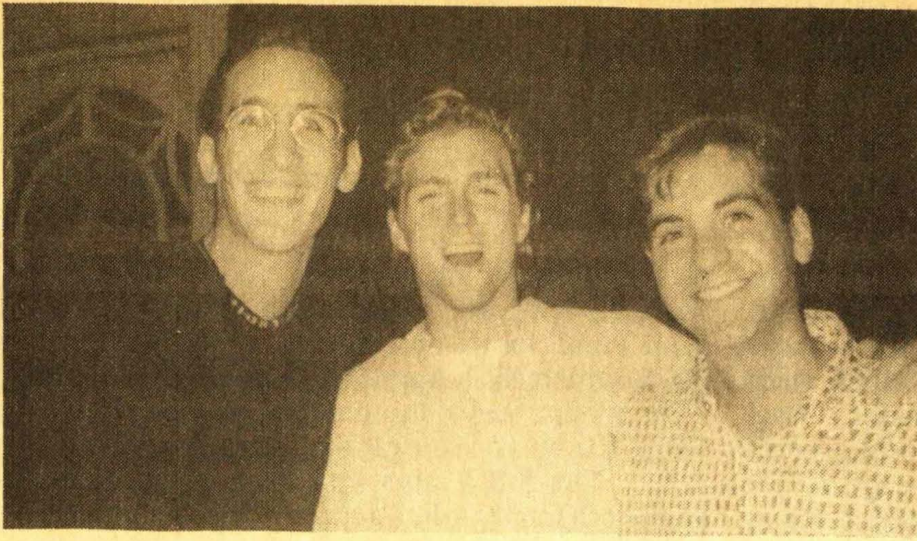
whimper in our own little world at 250 Joralemon Street, and we must make sure to never forget.

We should all understand that Anti-Semitism does not just happen to people like the Yankel Rosenbaum's of this world, and the Jews of a generation ago who lived and died in Europe. Anti-Semitism happens to people you know and can just as easily happen itself upon you without any warning. (Before you think I am painting a horribly bleak picture here, I must admit that for the most part, I, along with most other Jews in this country, have been fortunate enough to live my life relatively unmolested by those who hate me simply because I am a Jew. I am certainly grateful for that state of affairs, but recent events have simply given me a compelling excuse to write on the subject).

I often hear complaints from people that bringing up a subject such as Anti-Semitism does nothing more than perpetuate it. Rather, I am told, it is a taboo topic, best left alone and to remain buried in the memories of those who have lived and experienced it. What people often do not realize is that I am one of those people. Speaking about the subject and getting it out in the open forces other Jews to contemplate who they really are, and forces the truly ignorant and hateful to show the rest of humankind what true ignorance and true hate really look like.

I have gone through periods of my life where I questioned my identity, and that is a stage that I would suppose is quite normal for most people. But I learned a long time ago that I cannot hide my identity as a Jew anymore than a person can hide the color of his or her skin. The major difference is that I do not need to hide behind a speeding car, a can of spray paint, a mob of people, or a bathroom wall for that matter, to feel proud of who I am. I have been proud of who I am since I left my classmates in that hotel, and told a big kid with short black hair, blue jeans, and a brown plaid shirt, to get out of my way.

# FYI:

## Do You Know Where Your Money Goes?

A small percentage of each student's tuition is used to fund Brooklyn Law School Groups. The money is allocated by the Student Bar Association (S.B.A.) Budget Committee, which meets at the beginning of each Fall semester. Each student group submits a written proposal specifying how the money they request will be spent. The Committee analyzes each group's request, taking into consideration that group's prior budget and expenditures.

The S.B.A. Budget Committee operates according to certain guidelines. For example, if 25% of a group's allocated funds are not used by the end of the first semester, or the group has used more than 75%, that group's budget may be frozen and investigated by the S.B.A. Treasurer. The group may then be asked to demonstrate why their budget shall not revert back to the general fund. The S.B.A. Treasurer's decision on such a matter can only be overturned by a two third's vote of the S.B.A. House of Delegates. Therefore, the S.B.A. must remain aware of each group's financial activities throughout the year.

The remaining monies are allocated into several different funds: the *New And Unfunded*

*Groups Line*, for groups that are not in existence when the budgeting is done; the Capital Development Fund, for the purchase of capital expenses; the Supplemental Appropriations Line, for use when groups need additional funding; the *General Fund*, for bills and operating costs of the S.B.A.

The S.B.A. also sets some limits on the amount of money to be allocated for specific group activities. For an event where a speaker is in attendance, or a film is being shown, a group may not spend over \$50.00 on food or \$50.00 on drinks. If a group sponsors a party, the food and drink expenditure may not exceed \$125.00. A group may not spend more than \$50.00 for an individual speaker. However, these guidelines are flexible and can be altered to budget certain events according to their importance to the B.L.S. community.

The following is a list of each group's budget proposal and final allocations. The final allocation figures may be slightly higher or lower than what each group actually received. Also, the events listed were submitted in September, 1993 and may or may not have actually occurred. Any money not used by a group by the end of the school year will revert back to the S.B.A. General Fund.

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# The Gray

## (In Memory of Curt Cobain)

It is not long ago that a man named Curt took a shotgun, put it into his mouth, and pulled the trigger. The discharge of this single bullet brought the terrifying fear of mortality to the front of our minds. We are always in denial of this reality- who wants to think that life must end, that our worries must extend beyond getting the best grades, the best law job, the most money. But there is so much more to think about, so much more out there that can not simply be classified as black or white. Curt Cobain's senseless death screams at us that we must never forget the gray.

I guess what scares the hell out of me is that a man with so much success found life unbearable. But then I realize that he was just a man in pain. Not a superstar, not a role model, not an idol- but a man. I do not know if he was a good or honest person, but it is perfectly clear that Cobain was suffering. At first glance, his suicide represents the ultimate defiance of rationality. Here is a man that "had it all"- is that not what society recognizes as the main goal? Be successful and you will be, you must be, happy. And this man blew his head off. He said fuck you to the world and its generic definition of success. The moment he pulled that trigger, Cobain not only ended his misery, but also cursed us all who looked at him with envy, instead of with pity.

Curt had become the antithesis of his beliefs and fans ironically contributed to this misery by granting his fame. He was an artist that sang his pain. He wanted no more. What he got was adulation of millions that made him the success he

despised. So perhaps he was doomed- for his message of pain was lost in the admiring fans that closed their minds to his words. They listened to Nirvana and accepted agony as a part of his sound. But to Curt the words were what defined his tortured existence, and he could not convey this to thousands of fans as he stood on stage, or to millions over the radio. He was a rock star; a slave to public expectation, and he was burning up inside.

So what did others tell me about his death? Some said he was a coward and deserved what he got. Others adamantly refused to understand how a man so *successful* could kill himself. But everyone for at least one day pondered the reality of death. We attempted to enter the mind of a suicidal man in order to find an answer. Why? Why did he do it? Why would anyone do it? Suddenly, life's fragility was contemplated because of this violent act.

If this article seems disorganized, it is not through a lack of an effort to order it. It is because nothing about Cobain and the feelings inspired by his death are neat. We have been forced to deal with the problem of understanding what exactly is supposed to be the goal for life. There is no statute to turn to, no common law ruling to base a decision upon. Each of us are left on our own to find an answer. I am sickened that a man felt so alone and helpless. But perhaps in death Curt Cobain taught us an old lesson- that life is not necessarily as clear as many of us would like to think it is.

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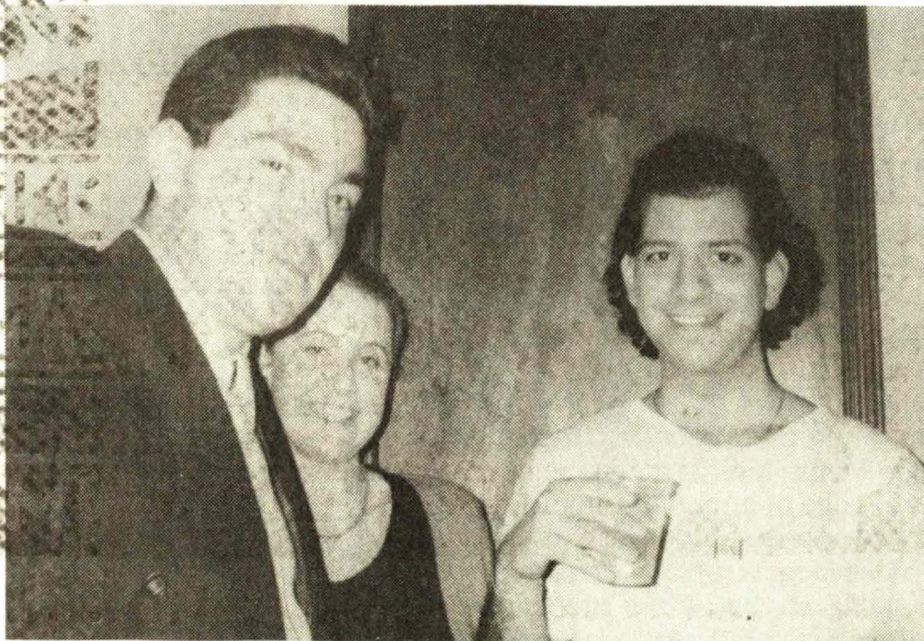
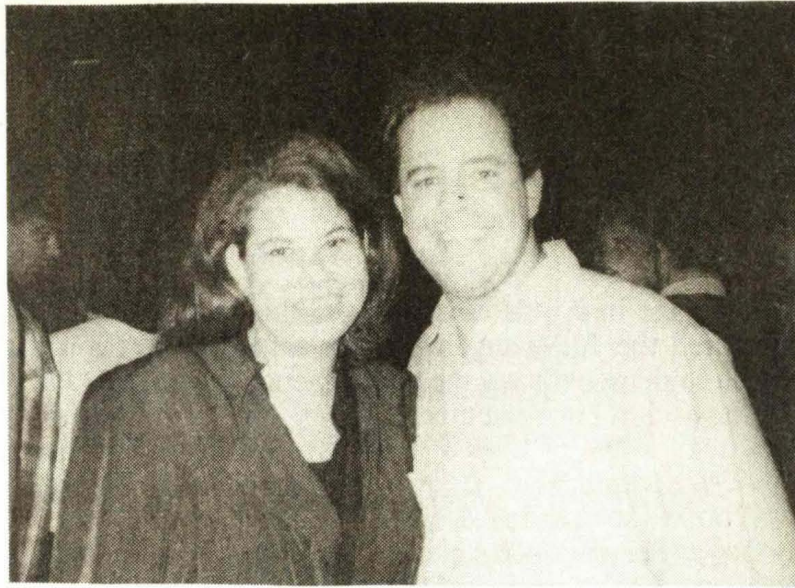
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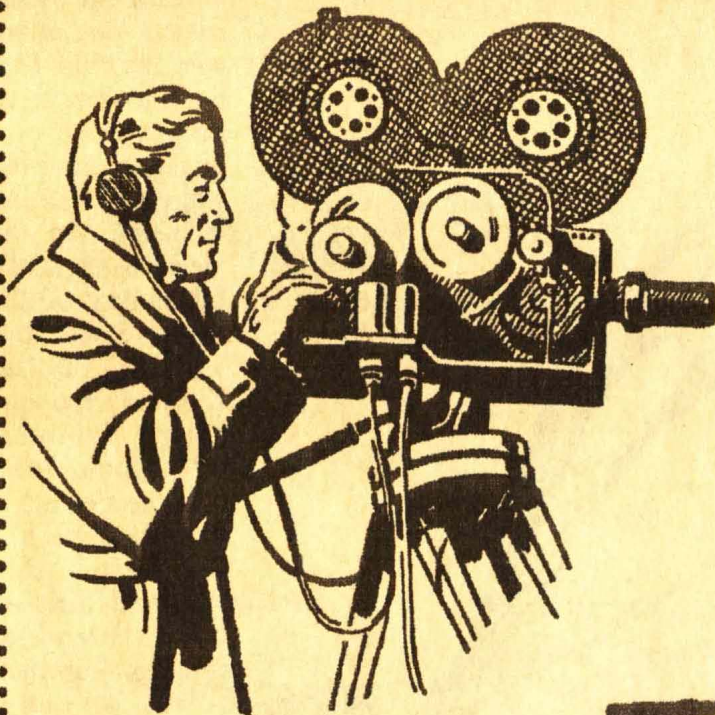

## Surviving the Game

Every now and then, Hollywood manages to slap together a film so bad that I feel compelled to tell people that I only saw the damn thing because someone invited me to a free screening of it—whether I actually paid to see it or not. *Surviving the Game* is just such a movie, and, mercifully, it really was a screening this time.

The film's premise—a group of wealthy, arrogant, and bloodthirsty men periodically head into the wilderness to stage a hunt for a pre-selected human quarry—is a '90s variation on an old story that has been filmed before and better. Ice T plays the latest victim, a homeless man who is chosen, we are told, as much for his tenacity as for the fact that his disappearance will go unnoticed. Yet, at the moment of his selection, he is attempting suicide—hardly evidence of the never-say-die attitude his captors vociferously claim he possesses. The hunters are played by, among others, Rutger Hauer, Gary Busey (who seems to have cornered the market on all those plum ex-C.I.A. psychopath roles out there), F. Murray Abraham, and Charles S. Dutton of *Roc* fame—at first glance, a powerhouse ensemble. But as the movie progresses, the poor quality of the writing has the distressing effect of putting non-actor Ice T and Oscar-winner Abraham on equal footing as performers.

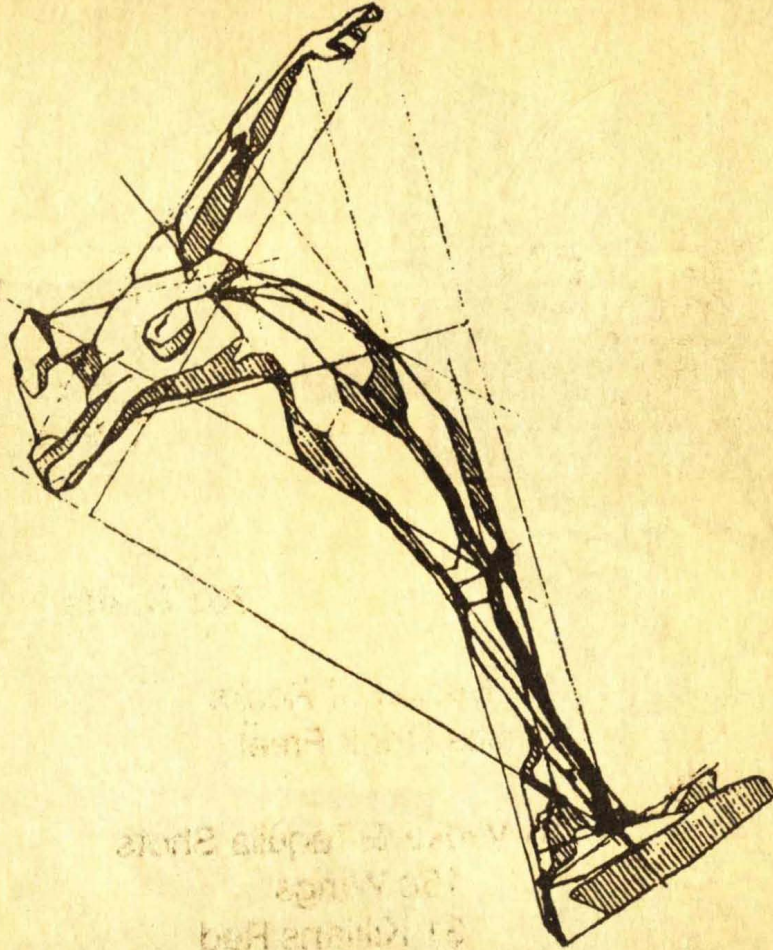
On the plus side, there is John McGinley's comic relief as a high-strung member of the hunting party. And Rutger Hauer, who is disappointingly unmenacing throughout, has an unintentionally-funny scene in which he selects a get-

## Schindler's List

Okay, this one is so high-profile that many will consider this review a waste of paper, and to them I say so are half of the outlines you have Xeroxed. But seriously, I have never before seen a treatment of the subject that manages, as this film does, to create an atmosphere in which it is possible, for fleeting moments, for the viewer to sense the full horror of the Final Solution. The bestial Kommandant (Ralph Fiennes, who should have won the Oscar) is the embodiment of the regime that spawned him—a bizarre blend of ruthless idealism (if you can call it that) and bottomless corruptibility that would be laughable were it not for the chilling

barbarism of that ideology. But he is more than just a symbol of Nazism, for it is well to bear in mind that, far from being a sadistic aberration, the Kommandant is the stock in trade, assembly-line product of Nazi indoctrination, an SS exemplar whose very inhumanity has allowed him to rise through the ranks so swiftly.

The figure of Oskar Schindler is more of a cypher—how are we to understand a man who undergoes so radical a transformation, from self-centered exploiter to selfless rescuer? Is it the gratifying power to commute a death sentence (with which Schindler cleverly but unsuccessfully tries to tempt the Kommandant) that so appeals to him, or can a person's essential nature either lay dormant till it is roused by an unacceptable reality





or spontaneously alter itself? Naturally, the latter two possibilities are to be preferred, be speaking as they do a world in which hatred and intolerance may one day lose their grip on our species.

As to the violence in the movie, be warned: it is unrelenting and, even in black and white, disturbing. However, to depict the Holocaust in less graphic terms would be to gloss over one of its harshest truths: life in the camps was, as Hobbes

would have put it, nasty, brutish and short. A random, death-dealing blow could fall on anyone at anytime. How else could such an environment be portrayed but as a milieu in which gratuitous violence was the daily routine?

So, for those of you who have been living under a rock for the past few months, *Schindler's List* is a must-see.

Everybody knows that dishonesty exists in the business world, but when you read this litany of rip-offs your head starts to spin. It is hard to imagine that the manufacturers of corrugated cardboard boxes would have any incentive to fix prices, until you learn that they settled their lawsuit for \$550 million! 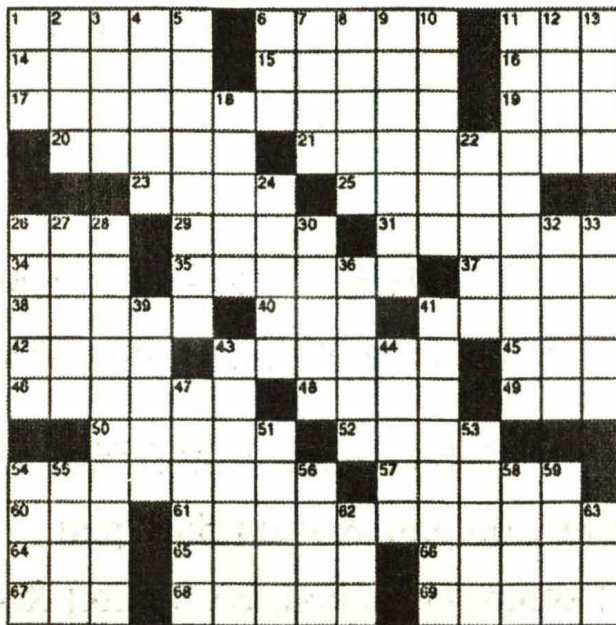
